Letter from the President

Thank you for your support and inspiration this past year! Together we finally completed the requirements needed to fully open Plum Island to the public (daytime, from Memorial Day through Labor Day). Visitors may now walk in the shadows of legends, view wildflowers unique to the area (such as the dwarf lake iris), listen to the chatter of birds on their migratory path, catch a glimpse of the deer that call the island 'home' and sit along



the shore to watch the freighters and ferries ply the waters of Death's Door.

The first project of 2017 was the completion of the dock, break wall and ferry trail. In partnership with the US Fish & Wildlife Service, we applied new roofs to the paint shed building, the Life-Saving Station and the Lighthouse Keepers Quarters. We completed the Historic Structures Report (HSR), which will guide our Island restoration project planning for many years to come. The non-native shrubs, that evaded the view of the Lighthouse Keepers Building, have been removed and a new Green Bay National Wildlife Refuge sign now welcomes visitors to this jewel of the Grand Traverse Islands archipelago.

2017 marks the 10-year anniversary of the Friends of Plum and Pilot Islands; with fondness, I look back at our humble beginnings:

- We no longer need to pump up the sidewalls of the old Coast Guard Zodiac before heading out to the Islands ... we now have the shiny silver 'Phebe' and 'Captain Dusty' to guide our way.
- No more guiding hikers over fallen logs on the trails ... we now have a team of patrol trail groomers, a chain saw (with a couple of certified operators) and tractor.
- Preservation materials no longer need to be cut with a handsaw ... a generator and circular saw do the trick much more efficiently.
- Remember that tent in the woods that covered the hole in the ground? Yep, progress!
- Placing the Aldo Leopold benches around the island is now done from the trailer instead of a two-wheel dolly, wheel barrow and the big blue tub on wheels.
- Trails are constantly mowed to keep the poison ivy at bay, and team of invasive eradicators have been specially trained to identify and remove hounds tongue, spotted knapweed and other invasive plants.

 Technology now connects us with board members that live as far away as Minnesota and Texas ... we can conduct board and committee meetings from the comfort of our home or a comfy lodge.

The next ten years will bring us closer to opening the buildings to the public; imagine walking in the footsteps of those bold mariners who risked their lives to save others! We have plans to restore the Life-Saving Station to its late 1930-40s grandeur, providing a base station for researchers, explorers and dreamers. We plan to set aside the boathouse as a maritime museum to share the wonderful discoveries that we've made, such as the pottery shards and toy pieces from the family that lived in the 1849 lighthouse which were found during the archaeological dig of 2010-2013. In time, the lighthouse keepers quarters will also be restored for those seeking out Plum for her rare avenues of solitude.

We ask for your continued support of our mission to preserve, restore and maintain the lighthouses, accessory buildings and other historic resources on Plum and Pilot Islands while providing opportunities for quality wildlife-dependent recreation on Plum Island. This year we made two amendments to our Bylaws:

2017 Progress







Time, high lake levels and storms seriously damaged the last 40 feet of the pier, the last 25 feet of the west break wall and the ferry haul road along the northeast side of Plum Island.

Repair to the pier involved using white oak trees harvested and milled to 12inch by 12inch beams on Chambers Island. Death's Door Marine moved the beams to Plum Island and started repairs on the pier and break wall in early November 2016.

Volunteers applied ample sweat equity in the Spring of 2017 to smooth the rip rap that filled the crib to position the 40 feet of the pier with new cedar boards.

The haul road eroded to a point where equipment necessary to replace the roof on the Life-Saving Station (furnished by USFWS), Paint Shed and Lighthouse Keepers Quarters could not enter Plum Island. The road was rebuilt to its design width, making it possible to land the roofing equipment.

The total cost to repair these structures was \$35,510.90 and was financed by private donations.



In 2016 FOPPI, in conjunction with the US Fish and Wildlife Service, were awarded a \$52,000 grant by Wisconsin Coastal Management Program to develop a Historic Structures Report (HSR) for Plum and Pilot Islands. The grant was a 50/50 match, meaning FOPPI provided half of the funds (\$26,000).

Architectural firm, Sanders and Czapski Associates were contracted to prepare the document. John Lauber (USFW) performed the

historical research and provided the historical section of the document.

The HSR provides documentary, graphic, and physical information about a property's history and existing condition. Broadly recognized as an effective part of preservation planning, a HSR also addresses management or owner goals for the use or re-use of the property. It provides a thoughtfully considered argument for selecting the most appropriate approach to treatment, prior to the commencement of work, and outlines a scope of recommended work. The report serves as an important guide for all changes made to a historic property during a project-repair, rehabilitation, or restoration – and can also provide information for maintenance procedures. Finally, it records the findings of research and investigation, as well as the processes of physical work, for future researchers.

The importance of a published HSR will provide the basis for restoration and preservation of the historical structures on Plum and Pilot Islands, and establish a long term programmatic agreement with the Wisconsin State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). A SHPO approved HSR identifies a significant historical period, which all future preservation activities and plans will be based upon. The HSR is critical to saving the facilities of both islands.

Having a HSR in place is appealing to grant writers, major donors and foundations and allows us to apply for funding that we didn't quality for earlier.

Complete with appendices, the report totals 708 pages. Total cost of all recommended restoration and preservation is estimated at \$6.5 million. Yes, we our work cut out for us!



The paint shed shingles were removed and new shingles purchased by USFWS. FOPPI paid for the labor to re-shingle the pain shed roof.

Contractor, Chewy & Teo Roofing and Siding removed and replaced the old shingles on the lighthouse keepers quarters with new high wind load shingles. They installed a ridged vent and replaced the rotten decking

and facias board were needed. The chimney was flashed with copper to prevent water leakage.

The total cost to replace the roof on these buildings was \$38,180.00 which was financed by private donations.



Two Commercial Special Use Permits (CSUP) for transportation to Plum Island through Shoreline Charters and Lew Clarke. Vendors applying to USFWS for a permit submitted proof of insurance coverage, a US Coast Guard Operator of Uninspected Passenger Vessels License, State of Wisconsin business license, State of Wisconsin boat registration and a current CPR and First Aid training certificate.

The CSUP provide additional exposure to the Green Bay National Wildlife Refuge and the opportunity to increase our membership base.

Committee Updates

In the 3rd quarter of 2017, FOPPI reorganized into various committees to grow our organization and leverage the strength of our board. Job descriptions were created, and the established committees began reporting on the activities they've completed, projects they're working on and areas that they need help with.

The current committees are:

- <u>Fundraising</u> Team Leader: Mary Beth Volmer
 The Fundraising Committee is vital to the life and financial well-being of the Friends of Plum and Pilot Islands. Our fundraising campaigns are varied, but focus on building relationships and raising money to meet the special and specific ongoing needs of our organization.
 - 2017 Activities: Ran campaigns through Facebook and Website. Worked with Special Events team on fundraising cruise.
 - 2018 Plan: Create formal fundraising and donor relations plan. Implement a Monthly Giving plan with our bank.
- <u>Historic Preservation</u> Team Leader: Paul Schumacher
 The Historic Preservation and Restoration (HPR) team works with the USFWS
 Regional Historic Preservation Officer/Archaeologist/staff and the FOPPI Board to plan and coordinate preservation and restoration projects to accomplish the goals set forth in the Historic Structures Report (HSR).
 - 2017 Activities: Completed the dock and break wall restoration, submitted the Historic Structures Report to the National Park Service, reroofed the paint shed and lighthouse keepers quarters
 - 2018 Plan: Ensure shingle repair is performed on the Life Saving Station (LSS), paint shed and Lighthouse Keepers Quarters (LKQ); Perform lead paint abatement removal and repaint the LSS and paint shed; finish the trim and gutters on the LKQ and tuckpoint all chimneys on the LSS and LKQ.
 - In addition, we'll be focusing on bringing potable water and better bathroom facilities to improve visitor experience; we are researching ways to reenergize the electrical grid to bring Plum Island back to life.
 - Pilot Island is on our radar too; we plan to reroof the summer kitchen and install bird deterrent grating to protect the lighthouse roof.

We learned the difficulty in government bidding for restoration work on a remote island in the middle of Lake Michigan and are working to address this by funding directly through FOPPI so we can employ local contractors to help stimulate the local economy.

• Marketing – Team Leader: Gordon Vieth

The marketing team builds awareness of FOPPI and its mission and achievements in the general public, with special attention to Door County and Washington Island. Marketing activities support merchandising, fundraising, volunteer and membership team.

- 2017 Activities: Regular submissions to the Washington Island Observer, "FOPPI Update"; Establishment of FOPPI Instagram account; Marketing of Sunset Cruise
- 2018 Plan: Release audio tour of the major stops along Plum Island. Publish book from the Historic Structures Report.

• Membership – Team Leader: Mary Beth Volmer

The membership team works with the treasurer to maintain membership lists, prepare donation thank you acknowledgments, and follow up with lapsed members to encourage renewals. Sends mailing list to printer for newsletter printing.

- 2017 Activities: Began meeting every three months; Updated Bylaws to reflect membership levels; Began quarterly phone calls to remind members their renewal is important; Updated membership packet to include a thank you card, membership card, latest newsletter, FOPPI brochure, wildlife brochures and a donation envelope; Began business membership campaign; Began identifying members by: How they joined (newsletter, website, Facebook, brochure) and how long they've been a member; note in newsletter
- 2018 Plan: Focus on building relationships with our members; Work to
 encourage free newsletter subscribers to become members; Increase
 membership rates; Remove renewal rate everyone will renew at the same
 rate as a new subscriber; Build our corporate membership base.

Program Highlights

Environmental Education

The Environmental Education Program's mission is to bring recreational and environmental wonder to the lives of youth. The Program was created to provide transportation to the Islands where youth may experience the beauty of one of the last 'wild' islands in the Grand Traverse archipelago.

Speakers Bureau

The Bureau offers informational presentations on the Friends of Plum and Pilot Islands and the Green Bay National Wildlife Refuge.

Women in Preservation

Founded in 2013, the Women in Preservation (WIP) continue to be a driving force in membership recruitment with their goal for each woman to leave the refuge with *dirt under their fingernails and knowledge within their soul*.

The total 'WIP Groupies' in 2017 were 28, with 7 being new. In 2017 WIP worked on the following projects:

- Built toolboxes
- Created GBNWR sign post on the south side of island and uncovered the historic walkway to Death's Door
- Established the first Plum Island monarch count and began a bat survey

Projects planned for 2018 include: Planting pollinator plants, making bat houses, established a purple martin habitat and assisting with preservation projects.

This new event was organized to celebrate International Migratory Bird Day. The team captured, weighed, measured, logged and released many different bird species




Explore Plum Island

Many people participated in the numerous activities on Plum Island during FOPPI's Explore Plum Island Days event. Nine intrepid paddlers kayaked and canoed to the island from Northport. Besides kayaking, folks learned more about the Niagara Escarpment, snorkelers explored the Grape Shot, and later they hiked the island and enjoyed the view from the top of the lighthouse tower.



Fundraising Cruise

The second annual cruise raised \$5000 for restoration and preservation projects and signed up 18 new members to assist in the effort. We didn't think we could top the eagle flying out from Plum Island on last year's cruise but the rainbow over the Range light and Keepers Building as we cruised past Plum Island gave everyone pause to reflect on the importance of restoring these historic structures.



Lighthouse Festival

The Door County Maritime Museum has offered Plum Island as a guided land-based tour since 2010 for their Spring festival. In 2017 they offered a Fall festival which brought 10 potential new members to the Island despite the cool weather.









Annual Membership Meeting
